Opening Prayer

Reflection

One of the most challenging but necessary practices within groups engaging in discernment is that of honest dialogue, what I call "contemplative dialogue" that both facilitates and manifests a group's way of being together.

Contemplative dialogue isn't easy to define but there are some qualifiers for it that can help us recognize when it is happening. In contemplative dialogue no word is the last word. Rather, we savor the space between the words, listening for some inner consonance...we can be with God in our differences, allowing those differences not to become a vehicle of separation but a window into the many facets of God's truth...we can begin to sort out what it is we must boldly claim and what we must let go. It is here that we can begin to see the inclusivity of truth.

Sometimes what we want to hold on to is some false identity, some sense of who we think we are or should be together. If we enter the process of discernment with more concern for protecting a false identity or for reaching a conclusion that we have predecided we should reach, there isn't much room for change, for transformation...Contemplative dialogue can manifest a group's willingness to allow God to reveal its true identity, to do a new deed among us.
